

From purple mountains' majesty to the fruited plain, we are a nation that has been mightily blessed by our heavenly Father. The poorest among us far exceed the living standards of most of the world. In the United States we shop the finest of stores with the greatest variety of wares the world has ever seen. When is the last time you encountered a person who was dying of starvation? Just think of the abundance of fruits in your local grocery store. The variety and amount are common place to us, but would be the envy of all of the rest of the world....and we take it for granted We are abundantly blessed as a nation, a people and as individuals. With that as a starting point and a given, let's unpack abundance.

Epitaphs are revealing expressions and summaries. If you don't write your own, what do you imagine yours might say, carved in granite for posterity? "Here lies one who lived abundantly." Would that be fitting for a summary of your earthly pilgrimage? Or not so much? If it would not fit on your headstone, maybe it would be a point of reflection for the life we are living before the epitaph.



Our central focus for this issue resounds in the word of Jesus in the Gospel of St. John, the 10<sup>th</sup> Chapter: "The Good Shepherd has come that we might have life and have it abundantly." How do the followers of Jesus Christ have life that is abundant? Do we strive for such a life? How do we understand that type of living and when do we know that we have arrived? Let's spend some time exploring.

Our culture entices us to work harder, sleep less, invest wisely and remain vigilant so that our lives are fulfilled and we are satisfied with the material pleasure of the American dream. Get your children into the best colleges. Make sure you have all the house your budget can afford. Sock away 10% in the 401k. Keep upward mobility at the top of the list of preferred futures and work diligently to attain. If we follow the herd, our efforts and our success are measured by that rubric. If we are fulfilled in these endeavors, our lives are abundant according to societal norms. We are much like the successful farmer who tore down his existing barns to build bigger because of his abundance. He would be declared a fool. Rich in things and poor in soul and the things of God.

As followers of Jesus, we strive to go where he went and live as he lived. By conventional standards, Jesus' life was not abundant. He said that birds have nests and the foxes have holes but the Son of Man has no place to lay his head. He was essentially homeless! Jesus had no paying vocation. He contributed to no pension plan. He was constantly surrounded by the sick, leprous, the dying, the unclean and the outcast. He probably had one set of clothing, and yet his life was as rich as any one person that walked this earth, even though our culture would deny his status. Jesus lived abundantly!

What was his secret to the abundant life that he wished for each of his followers? It starts in solitude, absolute solitude and quiet—a rare state in our lives. It is in that place with God's Word opened before our eyes that we connect with our heavenly Father, just as Jesus did on a daily basis. We quiet our hearts and minds with all their desires and distractions to hear the voice of God, the murmur that caused Elijah to cover his face in the presence of the Almighty. From this encounter gushed the power to live the life he lived, to perform the signs and wonders he

performed, and to proclaim the Kingdom with authority... poor in things but rich in relationship to his Father.

In addition to his connectedness, Jesus kept the first thing the only thing. The Kingdom of God was his sole incentive, even to the cross in Jerusalem for the sins of those consumed with self-centeredness and pleasure. The Kingdom call colored all he did and said so that others might reap the benefits of that calling and direction. In that Kingdom springs forth the abundant life that Jesus sacrificed to bring to each of us. As the hymn stanza reminds us, "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things will be added unto you. Alleluia!"

Now the crux becomes the ordering of our daily, abundant life living. How do I fully embrace my salvation and my connection with my heavenly Father and my Brother Jesus as the impetus to live counter-culturally and in service to all I meet? Because my life is abundant because of the gifts of forgiveness and sanctification, Word and Sacraments, I can give it away freely, knowing that the supply is endless, eternal. I don't have to hoard self or stuff because I can connect to the Life Giver, my heavenly Father through my Brother Jesus on a daily basis, because when I connect, "all things are added unto me." I am in need of nothing greater!

I just returned from 24 hours of solitude a few weeks ago. Sitting quietly with no distractions, save the Word of God and maybe hymnal, for an extended amount of time truly scared me initially. Being alone with God is most intimidating. No jukes or jives, just alone with self and Him, realizing that he knows my heart and yet comes seeking the connection with me so that I might hear his voice. Because of the experience and practice provided in that setting, I've attempted to employ some of that solitude in my daily, early morning time with God and his Word. I must admit that it is a difficult discipline to master, but the rewards are life changing, abundantly life changing.

Let me encourage you to start the discipline of daily quiet time with the Word and your heavenly Father. Be it early in the morning, at the noontime or the later hours of the day, set aside the time to listen to the voice of God. His plan is that you have life and have it abundantly, thankfully abundant in all circumstances.

It is a familiar plot device in movies and books. The main character has been a bit adrift in life, unsure of his identity. A new challenge or mission has materialized. It is a daunting and sometimes noble cause. It could be a new and dangerous enemy to vanquish, or an innocent party to rescue, or a powerful weapon that has fallen into the wrong



hands. Sometimes, it might even be a kind of a crime to be committed, a huge heist, though sometimes there is still some kind of underlying moral cause. Our hero is capable but he cannot accomplish the task on his own. He must gather his team. They each have peculiar gifts and talents, all valuable to the team. However, they too are adrift. They may be reluctant or disillusioned, having found other pursuits, sometimes in far-away places. Yet, their greatest talents are not being utilized. And they will find their highest fulfillment if they rejoin the team. The team is not always in complete agreement. When they are gathered, they may even bicker about the best strategy. Yet, once united and committed to the cause, they mesh together and defeat incredible odds. The goal is accomplished, the enemies are defeated and/or the treasure is attained. The team of heroes has triumphed!

Our music ministry needs heroes. The noble task is to enrich our worship with music. Each hero makes a contribution. The highly skilled can be valuable to the team. Yet, simpler music can also carry great messages. Our God has given us everything we have. He is an all-powerful and glorious God who deserves our highest praise and the best gifts we can offer. And when we present the messages of His Word and Sacraments we should employ our best resources, giving back some of the treasures that God has given to us and using the skills that we have for the advancement of His kingdom. Music is God's gift. In our media-filled world music is all around us, on TV, radio, Spotify, mp3, social media, video games and many more. While secular music is not all bad, many times it promotes ideas and thoughts not in harmony with the abundant life that is set forth for us in Christianity. Should we not employ God's gift of music to promote the positive messages and ideas in our worship?

Maybe you can sing or play an instrument. You may have been involved in Hope music in the past. Or, maybe you learned your skills at school or in private lessons or in a community group. We want to find a place for you to share that gift. And how great to use that God-given skill to enrich our worship!

Yet, even if you don't have that kind of skill you can still be a hero. You might be a spouse who steps up to mow the lawn, or fix dinner or do the dishes so that your spouse is able to get to some weekly rehearsal or special occasion. You might be the parent or grandparent who drives kids, or grandkids or neighbor kids to a music activity. Can you help your busy teenager find a way to fit some church music making in their schedule? Or maybe you can volunteer in some way to advance our musical activities. All kinds of heroes make up the team.

The task of music ministry can be challenging. Some of our musical heroes have challenging careers and/or a busy family life. We have responsibilities, health issues of our own or of our relatives. We have weekly routines that would have to be altered in order to serve in music ministry. It is easier

to say "no" or "maybe next year". On the other hand, maybe this year **IS** "next year" and the time has come for you to serve. In serving, you may find blessings that bring you strength and enable you to carry out some of your other roles and tasks. Prayerfully consider whether you can be a hero in our music ministry this year. On Tuesdays, Strings/Woodwinds meets at 6:00 PM, Brass at 7:00 PM and Jubilate Bells at 8:00 PM. On Wednesday we have Kids Choir at 5:15 PM, Children's Choir at 6:30 and Sanctuary Choir for youth and adults at 8:00 PM. More Hand Bell opportunities are in the works. 

Methodist Church to offer Upward Basketball and Cheerleading since 2012. Each season we welcome over 200 children and their families to our campus to teach them basketball skills, but more importantly, to share our faith. Devotion and prayer time is a scheduled part of each practice and game.

Our Upward program is a volunteer run outreach ministry. Everyone from coaches to referees to half-time devotion leaders volunteer their time to make the season a success.

Upward Basketball and cheerleading is available for children ages Pre K 4 - 6th grade. Four year old players must be 4 by September 1, 2019.

Registration typically opens in September, evaluations are held in October, and practices begin in December. Our 8-week game season runs in January and February.

Last summer, my family and I were in Washington D.C. We took a side trip to tour the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. 


Many current members of Hope were not here for the Sanctuary's construction. Many were not yet born! Here are some facts about its construction:

## Did you know...

- the groundbreaking took place on December 12, 1993?
- the Sanctuary took nine months to build?
- before construction, the site included numerous oak trees and two Scout buildings? (one for Boy Scouts and one for Girl Scouts)?
- 6000 cubic yards of earth were brought in to raise the ground level of the Sanctuary by 13 feet?
- just six beams fabricated in Tennessee from laminated pine hold up the entire roof structure?
- the original construction had five classrooms around the back of the nave? (Look at the last few pews, they were added later when the classrooms were removed to expand seating. They are just a bit taller than the original pews.)
- the original triangle-shaped glass window behind the balcony was blown in during a storm?
- the original window above the altar was clear. A faceted-glass window was put in its place to reduce the glare.


